Anyhow, I had two very enjoyable boat trips, the first being the Shad trip on the Roanoke River.

Thanks kindly to **Tim Ross** from the Raleigh Chapter we both enjoyed a wonderful day on the river. After many phone calls and emails we set our date, Tim had been watching the rising water levels and waiting for the right moment, although Tim had been out the day before and had a tremendous day our trip apparently proved to not be as productive, yet we caught plenty to say the least.

I was pleased to win this trip as I had recently watched a day on the Shad on UNC-TV fishing show and at that time thought what fun, Tim & I set off for Weldon NC just north of Roanoke, put the Jon boat in right at that same spot where they had filmed the fishing show. 2009 KIDS FISH-FOR-FUN EVENTS

National Fishing and Boating Week occurs each year during the first week of June. During that week, **Fish-For-Fun** events are held across the state for youth. The name of each youth that participates is entered into a drawing to receive a lifetime fishing license. State law does not allow NCWRC to give away the licenses so they must be bought and donated by an organization. I am proud to say that the North Carolina State Council of Trout Unlimited one of the licenses this year. The press release below was taken from NCWRC's website.

RALEIGH, N.C. (July 1, 2009) — Zack Kahl, of Jacksonville, and Miah Domel, of Morehead City, are two young anglers who love to fish. Thanks to Neuse Sport Shop and the N.C. State Council of Trout Unlimited, they will be able to indulge their passion for fishing for the rest of their lives – without ever having to pay for a license.

Zack, 12, and Miah, 9, won the top prizes, lifetime fishing licenses, in a statewide drawing from participants in 40 kids' "Fish-For-Fun" events held in celebration of National Fishing and Boating Week earlier this month.

Zack won a lifetime freshwater/saltwater combination fishing license, donated by Neuse Sport Shop, located in Kinston, while Miah won a lifetime freshwater fishing license, donated by the N.C. State Council of Trout Unlimited.

Zack's license, which is valued at \$450, gives him fishing privileges in all public waters in North Carolina, including designated mountain trout waters, trout waters on game lands, joint waters and coastal waters. Miah's license, valued at \$250, gives her fishing privileges in all public waters in North Carolina, including designated mountain trout waters, trout waters on game lands and joint waters.

Zack participated in the June 6 kids' fishing event at Ord Pond in Jacksonville, while Miah participated in the June 6 event at Lake Powhatan in Buncombe County.

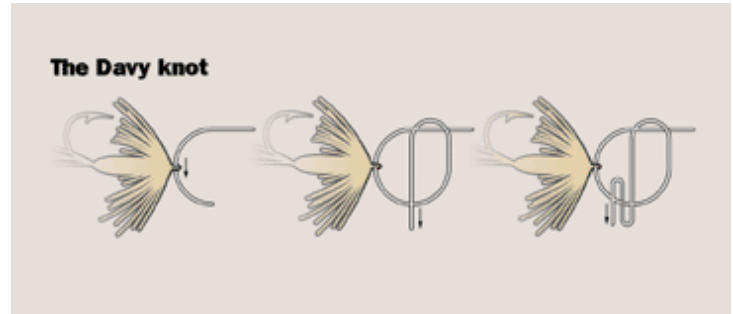
In addition to the Ord Pond and Lake Powhatan events, the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, along with the U.S. Forest Service and Bass Pro Shops, supported 38 other free fishing events during National Fishing and Boating Week, all aimed at promoting fishing as a fun activity the whole family can enjoy.

At each event, participants who registered were entered into a random drawing for fishing-related prizes. In addition to the lifetime fishing licenses, rods and reels, tackle boxes, fish playing cards and spools of fishing line were donated by Bass Pro Shops and the Wildlife Commission. THE DAVY KNOT

I like knots but tend to tie the same knot all the time, the Clinch Knot. One of the knots that I have an interest in learning is the Davy Knot, although I have had limited success. It is a simple not that is easily tied and has a high breaking strength. Perhaps you can teach it to me later.



Follow these instructions to tie the knot:

1. Take your fly and pass your tippet through the bottom of the eyelet. Turn the fly upside down so the hook point is turned up or on the top.
2. With the fly extended to the left, pull or extend about three or four inches of tippet through the eye.
3. Take your tag piece of mono and pass over the top of the main leader (away from you) and draw it back through, making a loop.
4. Take the tippet and pass it under, then over the top of the bottom leg of the loop. If you have been successful, the tag end will point directly toward you.
5. To secure the knot, bite the tag piece and pull the leader end taut, causing the knot to close. If you have tied the Davy knot properly, the knot is firmly fastened and will not slip.
