NATURE DAY AT SOUTH MOUNTAIN BY JOYCE SHEPHERD

On October 18, 2008 four members of Rocky River TU manned a display booth at South Mountains State Park's sixth annual Nature Day. While **Nick Marmigas** and **Joyce Shepherd** demonstrated the art of fly tying, **Bill Thomas** demonstrated and provided fly casting lessons from 11:00am to 4:00pm to all park visitors. There was a lot of interest from young children to adults who have never held a fly rod. Bill proved to be a great caster and teacher. **Alen Baker** spoke with visitors about Trout Unlimited and our mission of cold water fisheries conservation and captured the information of all interested individuals. He also provided pictures of our most recent stream clean-up of rock dams, our bank restoration efforts which included moving rocks to shore up eroded banks, the planting of trees, shrubs and other vegetative materials to close unauthorized trails made by hikers and fishers in South Mountains State Park and Goose Creek.

BREAKING THE SNAIL MAIL HABIT

TELLICO OHV LAWSUIT

The attorneys representing the OHV clubs filed a motion to voluntarily dismiss the lawsuit they filed against the Forest Service. They withdrew their suit after the Forest Service filed their motion to dismiss. Because the Forest Service's action to date has been temporary and taken to allow them to collect data before making permanent recommendations, the suit brought by the OHV clubs had no legitimate claim.

Possibly by the time of the next meeting the Forest Service will have issued their recommendations. There will be about a half dozen plans one of which will be identified as the Forest Service's preferred plan. The Forest Service will then allow a 45 day comment period and I will pass on to you the plan that is supported by TU.
